

Saint Blaise

Legend says that Blaise was an excellent physician in his hometown of Sebaste, Armenia, modern-day Silvas, Turkey. When the Bishop of Sebaste died, Blaise was chosen as the new bishop by the popular acclaim "of all the people." He was said to be a man of great faith and virtue, caring for his people in both body and soul. Many came to

him as a physician for physical healing but also received many miracles. Others came to him for spiritual healing, imparted by his deep faith.

Even though Christianity became legal in the Roman Empire in 313, the Governor of Cappadocia began to arrest and kill Christians in 316. Bishop Blaise was among those arrested. While Blaise was on his way to jail, the mother of a boy who was choking on a fishbone sent her son to Blaise for his prayers. Bishop Blaise miraculously cured him on the spot.

Another story relates that on that journey to jail, a woman begged him to save her pig that had been seized by a wolf. When Bishop Blaise ordered the wolf to release the pig, the wolf obeyed. Out of gratitude, the woman brought Blaise two wax candles to light his prison cell.

When Bishop Blaise refused to renounce his Christian faith, he was ripped apart by metal combs used to comb wool and then beheaded.

Today, Saint Blaise is the patron saint of wool combers and animals. More famously, he is the patron saint of diseases of the throat and other illnesses because he healed the boy with a fishbone stuck in his throat, was a physician, and miraculously healed many others of their ailments. Two wax candles are used to bless throats in memory of the candles that the grateful woman brought to Blaise's jail cell.



Reflections on the Readings



God Bleaches Us to the Bone

At first glance, the presentation of the infant Jesus in the temple appears to be a peaceful scene. His parents present him. They bring along an offering. Prophets ooh and aah over the baby Jesus. They predict marvelous things. The parents are very proud. You can almost feel hearts flutter.

But hearts shudder at the scene from Malachi. God says, "Suddenly there will come to the temple the Lord whom you seek." He comes like a refiner's fire or like fuller's lye. He comes able to burn you to ash and bleach you to the bone. In Malachi, the Lord's coming to the temple is not at all peaceful.

This terrifying appearance corrected a problem. The priests of the temple were not offering a due sacrifice to God. Perhaps they were unclean themselves. Perhaps they did not observe God's commands. They needed correction, so God prophesied that the Lord himself would appear in the temple to set things right. That tiny baby gurgling in the arms of his parents grew up to be the Savior who reads the thoughts of hearts and calls us to conversion.

In Baptism we were anointed as a priestly people. Let God's fire purge whatever keeps us from sincere prayer.

Gaining Experience

Parents start their job as mothers and fathers with experience. They watched the experience of their own parents, and they see the parenting of their friends. But parents also bring their own experience of growing up. They went through what their kids go through, and they bring that wisdom to the task.

As children grow into adolescence, parents often struggle with them. Parents are often sustained by the memory of their own adolescence. When they were younger, they had to go through those difficult years as well.

Jesus also had to gain experience. He was to become the redeemer of the human race, so God saw fit to have Jesus spend time as a human, in order to experience what we do.


The Letter to the Hebrews says, "Jesus had to become like his brothers and sisters in every way, that he might be a merciful and faithful high priest before God to expiate the sins of the people."

On the Feast of the Presentation, we remember that the parents of Jesus brought him to the temple at the age of forty days. Jesus was God. It should not have been necessary for him to do this. But he did this, and much more, to become like the people he would save. He understands the struggles of parents and teens, of those who are tempted and those who hope for more— because he became one like us
